Liturgical Notes

At every Divine Liturgy, just after the Gospel and Homily **as we begin the Augmented Litany**, two or three parishioners need to **take all collection baskets in the church**, **and bring them forward to the foot of the solea**. At the end of the Augmented Litany, during the petition "Again we pray for those who bring offerings ...", **those baskets will be blessed**, and placed near the front of the temple for the remainder of the service. This can be a different two or three parishioners each time; it does not need to be members of the council.

Beginning today, please be prepared to pray the **prayer before communion** all together, **prior** to the clergy receiving (instead of separately, after the chalice is brought forward). This is in line with the liturgical principles and practices of our hierarch. (It also helps the clergy give more attention to this prayer since we are all saying it at the same time, rather than the clergy saying it while the choir is singing something different.)

The services of Vespers are given to ALL, every single one of us, as part of our preparation for the Divine Liturgy. It is in the hymns of Vespers that we actually learn what we believe. If we care about what we believe, then we will make an effort to come and experience these other moments of prayer outside of the Sunday Liturgy.

The best time to come to **confession** is **at the end of an evening service**, if you are able. It is difficult to hear multiple confessions right before the start of the Divine Liturgy.

Epistle: 2 Corinthians 6:16-7:1
