## **Announcements**

St Michael's Center now has a buyer and the sale is expected to close sometime in November. This action was authorized by the Parish at its Annual General Assembly on February 19, 2023.

**TODAY** is our **St Michael's Day Potluck Dinner**, following Liturgy! We ask everyone to contribute \$10 per person. Please give more if you are able.

Saturday, November 11, 11:00 a.m. – A Veteran's Day Ceremony will be held at WWI Veterans' Park on Bridge Street, with a **light lunch to follow** at St James-St George Episcopal Church, offered by American Legion 405 and the Jermyn Shade Tree Commission. All residents and parishioners of all houses of worship in Jermyn are invited to attend the ceremony and lunch. St Michael's will join with the other churches in Jermyn with the ringing of bells at 11:00 a.m. in remembrance of the WWI Armistice and in prayer for all those who serve and have served in our armed forces.

**Saturday, November 18** is our **Church Cleanup Day!** We will begin at 9 am in the church basement. Please come help us clean and reorganize this important part of our church.

**Saturday, November 18** is also our very first "Super Saturday" for children, teens, & young adults. This month's activity is all about the *preparation* for the Divine Liturgy. We will bake *Prosphora* together (the bread for the Liturgy) and learn about *Proskomedia* (the small ritual done prior to the Divine Liturgy where that bread is prepared for the Eucharist). Followed by board games, Vespers, and pizza. We hope to get started at 1:30 and end by about 5:30. *ALL children & teens, even from our parish's "extended family", are invited.* 

On **Sunday**, **November 19**, the *Proskomedia* will begin **at 9:30**, in the main part of the Church. This ritual is normally hidden inside the Altar before the beginning of Liturgy, so this is a great opportunity to see it up close. This is where the bread offering is prepared for the Eucharist, along with commemorations for the living & departed. **Please try to arrive by 9:20** so you can experience this in its fullness. *Please encourage all the children and youth of our parish family* (and extended family) to come on this day and learn about this part of our Faith.

Saturday, December 2: Our Deanery (our group of NEPA OCA parishes) is holding a retreat for *all members of our parishes* at All Saints in Olyphant (211 Willow Ave). Divine Liturgy at 9am, followed by Brunch and then a Talk/Q&A with Nathan Hoppe, the longest-serving field missionary of the Orthodox Christian Mission Center (OCMC). This is a free event, but please sign up (in the narthex) so they know how many people to expect.

SAVE THE DATE! SAVE YOUR RECIPES! Saturday December 9 is our first annual Christmas Holiday "Cookie Walk". We invite all families to participate in baking your favorite family or heirloom recipe cookies to sell to the public. Each family bakes and freezes 200 cookies ahead of time, and brings them to the church on the day before the sale. "An Orthodox parish has only one God-given reason for being. It exists to be the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church of Christ. Whatever the original reasons and conditions for its founding, whatever other services and activities it may provide, whatever other desires and needs it may fulfill for its members, a community of Orthodox Christians must be Christ's one holy Church. If it is not, then it is neither Christian nor Orthodox, whatever else it may be and do.

"A parish must be  $\underline{the}$  Church of Christ, and not simply  $\underline{a}$  church, because, according to the Orthodox faith, every local community of Orthodox Christians with a priest must be, and theologically understood actually is, **the one Church of Christ**. Theologically speaking, there are not *many* Orthodox Churches; there is only *one*. An Orthodox parish is this one Church, or it is not an Orthodox church at all. Each parish, therefore, must be the one and only Church of Christ.

"Everything in the parish, and everything about it, **must be holy** because God and Christ are holy. There can be no part of a parish that is not sanctified by the holiness of God and His Son Jesus Christ, "the holy One of God." There can be no aspect of a parish not inspired and empowered by God's Holy Spirit, who is the Spirit of God and of Christ. Everything in and about a parish—its organization, structure, administration, finances and properties, as well as its theological and moral teachings and practices, and its liturgical and sacramental rites and services—must be of God. They must be determined by God, inspired by God and submitted to God for His glory and the good of His people."

## Today's Scripture

#### Epistle:

*Brethren:* See with what large letters I have written to you with my own hand!

As many as desire to make a good showing in the flesh, these would compel you to be circumcised, only that they may not suffer persecution for the cross of Christ. For not even those who are circumcised keep the law, but they desire to have you circumcised that they may boast in your flesh.

But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision avails anything, but a new creation.

And as many as walk according to this rule, peace and mercy be upon them, and upon the Israel of God. From now on let no one trouble me, for I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus. Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.

Gospel: Luke 8:26-39

At that time, there came a man named Jairus, and he was a ruler of the synagogue. And he fell down at Jesus' feet and begged Him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter about twelve years of age, and she was dying.

But as He went, the multitudes thronged Him. Now a woman, having a flow of blood for twelve years, who had spent all her livelihood on physicians and could not be healed by any, came from behind and touched the border of His garment. And immediately her flow of blood stopped. And Jesus said, "Who touched Me?" When all denied it, Peter and those with him said, "Master, the multitudes throng and press You, and You say, 'Who touched Me?" But Jesus said, "Somebody touched Me, for I perceived power going out from Me." Now when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling; and falling down before Him, she declared to Him in the presence of all the people the reason she had touched Him and how she was healed immediately. And He said to her, "Daughter, be of good cheer; your faith has made you well. Go in peace."

While He was still speaking, someone came from the ruler of the synagogue's house, saying to him, "Your daughter is dead. Do not trouble the Teacher." But when Jesus heard it, He answered him, saying, "Do not be afraid; only believe, and she will be made well." When He came into the house, He permitted no one to go in except Peter, James, and John, and the father and mother of the girl. Now all wept and mourned for her; but He said, "Do not weep; she is not dead, but sleeping." And they ridiculed Him, knowing that she was dead. But He put them all outside, took her by the hand and called, saying, "Little girl, arise." Then her spirit returned, and she arose immediately. And He commanded that she be given something to eat. And her parents were astonished, but He charged them to tell no one what had happened.

#### The Faith We Hold

*The Liturgy: Common Worship.* We have spoken about the Holy Liturgy as a service in which we receive Holy Communion, the medicine of immortality, as it was called by the Apostolic Fathers. But at the same time **the Liturgy is much more than spiritual medicine for individual church members**. The very name *liturgy* – borrowed from the Greek – means *public service*. In the Liturgy the Church fulfills itself; only then is it the ecclesia **gathered in one place for common action and service**. The reason for this coming together and its purpose may be deduced from the following words of the Apostle:

And like living stones be yourselves built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ ... But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of Him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. Once you were no people but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy. (1 Pet 2:5; 9-10)

These words of the Apostle indicate that terms formerly applied to Israel now belong to **the new Israel**, **to the Christians**, **the ecclesia**, **the Church**. Whereas previously only Aaron's family had been chosen to serve as priests, now the new Israel as a whole, **all the members of the Church**, are a chosen, **holy family**, a royal priesthood and God's own people. As a holy priesthood they are all called to "offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ."

This bringing of spiritual offerings is just what takes place in the Holy Liturgy, which the whole people of God performs as a common service. All **the prayers** of the Holy Liturgy, with a very few exceptions, **are in the plural**, and thus intended **to be read or sung in the name of the whole people of God**.
