**Saturday, November 18** is our **Church Cleanup Day!** We will begin at 9 am in the church basement. Please come help us clean and reorganize this important part of our church.

**Saturday, November 18** is also our very first <u>"Super Saturday" for children, teens, & young adults</u>. This month's activity is all about the *preparation* for the Divine Liturgy. We will **bake** *Prosphora* together (the bread for the Liturgy) and learn about *Proskomedia* (the small ritual done prior to the Divine Liturgy where that bread is prepared for the Eucharist). Followed by board games, Vespers, and pizza. We hope to get started at 1:30 and end by about 5:30. *ALL children & teens, even from our parish's "extended family", are invited.* 

On **Sunday**, **November 19**, the *Proskomedia* will begin **at 9:30**, in the main part of the Church. This ritual is normally hidden inside the Altar before the beginning of Liturgy, so this is a great opportunity to see it up close. This is where the bread offering is prepared for the Eucharist, along with commemorations for the living & departed. **Please try to arrive by 9:20** so you can experience this in its fullness. *Please encourage all the children and youth of our parish family* (and extended family) to come on this day and learn about this part of our Faith.

Saturday, December 2: Our Deanery (our group of NEPA OCA parishes) is holding a retreat for all members of our parishes at All Saints in Olyphant (211 Willow Ave). Divine Liturgy at 9am, followed by Brunch and then a Talk/Q&A with Nathan Hoppe, the longest-serving field missionary of the Orthodox Christian Mission Center (OCMC). Mr. Hoppe will talk about the importance of the mission mindset in the parish, and reflect on his international missionary labors over the years. The lecture will begin at noon, followed by Q&A, ending by 2 PM. Choir members from the Deanery are also invited to participate. This is a free event, but please sign up (in the narthex) by Nov. 26, so our hosts at All Saints can plan for the day. We look forward to gathering once again with our brothers and sisters throughout the Wilkes-Barre Deanery.

We invite all families to participate in baking your favorite family or heirloom recipe cookies to sell to the public. ## Today's Scripture

Epistle: Ephesians 2:4-10

Brethren: God, who is rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in trespasses, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), and raised us up together, and made us sit together in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them.

Gospel: Luke 8:26-39

At that time, a certain lawyer stood up and tested Him, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What is your reading of it?" So he answered and said, "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind,' and 'your neighbor as yourself." And He said to him, "You have answered rightly; do this and you will live." But he, wanting to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Then Jesus answered and said: "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a certain priest came down that road. And when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. Likewise a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came and looked, and passed by on the other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had compassion. So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, "Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you."

So which of these three do you think was neighbor to him who fell among the thieves?" And he said, "He who showed mercy on him." Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

He Who rejoices in the glory of God and in everything that reminds him of it **in this life** will also rejoice in the age to come. **He who in this life strove toward Go**d will rush to Him joyfully when he hears the words, "Come unto Me, ye blessed ones" at the dread judgment.

All those who do not know how to rejoice in the glory of God, in whom the divine realm and its laws cause discontent, who love darkness or gloom, who do not love the light, will not respond to the call of "Come unto Me." They will shrink back in indignation, dissatisfaction, in jealousy and anger, from the humble and the meek who will go toward the light, from God Himself, Whom they will begin to blame for being in their disposition. They will even shrink from themselves, though they will not want to admit their guilt. Such a state is true suffering.

Hades is not a place, no, but a state of the soul. It begins here on earth. Just so, **paradise begins in the soul** of a man here in the earthly life. Here **we already have contact with the divine**, on the day of the Bright Resurrection and **when we worthily receive Holy Communion**.

It is necessary to prepare for confession: the whole infection must be removed, for if there is any left, suppuration will begin. It is necessary to pray for repentance and for the joy of purification, so that a ray of light will touch our soul and it will come to love the light.

It is necessary to pray to meet the Risen Christ with a clean heart, to taste of the joy of the kingdom of heaven at least in the smallest degree.

*Spiritual Guidance.* The spiritual struggle of a Christian **has never been easy**. He has to contend not only against the obvious temptations of the world and against the corruption in himself, not only "against flesh and blood, but against… the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places." (*Eph 6:12*)

In addition to the decisive support which participation in the life of the Church offers him, he is comforted by the knowledge that there exists a "great cloud of witnesses," **those who have already been through the same struggles** and know how to advise and encourage people who follow in their footsteps. **The spiritual experience of numerous ascetics** is contained in crystallized form in the writings of the Fathers. **We can draw on their spiritual wisdom** when it is hard to find living examples and guides for the spiritual life, as is the case in our time.

Humble enjoyment of the teachings of the Fathers, whether in the monastic cell of an elder or through books, **is a basic part of Orthodox devotional life**. "He who has learned obedience," the Fathers advise, "will himself be heard and will enter boldly into the presence of the Crucified One," for the Crucified Lord Himself was "obedient unto death." (*Phil* 2:8)
