Every **successful** ministry in the Church is due to the work of the Holy Spirit... Just as one body has many members, each with its own function, so **the Church has multiple gifts**, each serving a specific **purpose** and complementing the other gifts...

Epistle: Hebrews 11:33-12:2

Brethren: By faith, the Saints subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the enemies. Women received their dead raised to life again. And others were tortured, not accepting deliverance, that they might obtain a better resurrection. Still others had trial of cruel mockings and scourgings, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented; of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, having obtained a good report through faith, did not receive the promise. God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect without us.

Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith. Gospel: Matthew 10:32-33, 37-38; 19:27-30 The Lord said to his disciples, "Every one who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven; but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven.

"He who loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and he who loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and he who does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me."

Then Peter said in reply, "Lo, we have left everything and followed you. What then shall we have?" Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of man shall sit on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And every one who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or wife or children or lands, for my name's sake, will receive a hundred-fold, and inherit eternal life. But many that are first will be last, and the last first."

While physical fatigue may be alleviated by a good night sleep; even that sleep flees from us in face of anxiety, depression, and the stress of a thousand problems waiting for resolution. Behaviorists will rightly point out that diet, proper exercise, and recreation can help us get more balanced, but **unless we deal with the inner causes** of our condition, **we will never really be free**, nor able to positively influence our condition. *What, then, can we do?*

To the fearful and sorrowing, to those "troubled about many things" (Luke 10:41), to those "that labour and are heavy laden," (Matthew 11:28), there is Someone who can "satisfy the weary soul and replenish the sorrowful soul" (Jeremiah 31:25), and ultimately "give us rest" (Matthew 11:28). There is one Person who can change our inner state and give us the freedom we desire and that Person is Christ.

Rather than focusing on what is causing fatigue, stress, and cognitive overload that does not allow us to remain in control; the Church Fathers suggest focusing on Christ and letting Him have control over our hearts, bringing us rest, the assurance of His care, and trust that He will take care of our tomorrow if we give Him our today. And one simple, yet powerful, way to do this is through the practice of the Jesus Prayer.
