# Today's Scripture

Epistle: 1 Timothy 2:1-7

My son Timothy: I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men, for kings and all who are in authority, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence. For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

For there is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time, for which I was appointed a preacher and an apostle – I am speaking the truth in Christ and not lying – a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

Gospel: Matthew 14:22-34

At that time, Jesus came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up. And as His custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up to read. And He was handed the book of the prophet Isaiah. And when He had opened the book, He found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the LORD is upon Me,

because He has anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor;

He has sent Me to heal the brokenhearted,

to proclaim liberty to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind,

to set at liberty those who are oppressed;

to proclaim the acceptable year of the LORD."

Then He closed the book, and gave it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all who were in the synagogue were fixed on Him. And He began to say to them, "Today this Scripture is fulfilled in your hearing." So all bore witness to Him, and marveled at the gracious words which proceeded out of His mouth.

Our way forward will not be found in debating the Divinity of Christ, nor will it be found in changing any of our Lord's teachings. It cannot be found in the dismantling of the Church, either. We are so incredibly fortunate to have inherited the full deposit of faith (Jude 1:3).... This work is primarily a process of recovering and remembering who we are.

In the final verses of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells His disciples, "Go ... and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you" (Matt 28:19-20). These were the last words Jesus said to His disciples before ascending into heaven. In time, this passage of Holy Scripture came to be known as the Great Commission. Jesus was reminding His disciples that He wanted everyone to hear and accept the teachings He had shared with them.

... The apostles were faithful to Jesus' instructions. They set out to change the world with His message. Fortunately, this movement to spread the life of Jesus didn't end after the original band of twelve departed from this life. After them, others accepted Christ's commandment, and, sharing the same vision as the Twelve Apostles had, new bands of followers also went forth as ambassadors of Christ. Today as we survey the landscape within our Christian communities, we notice that many faithful followers of the Way (John 14:6) are still motivated by Jesus' life, His words, and His truth, and they too want to share the Good News with others.
